Denzel was a victim of circumstances he did not create. Gradually, his support system dwindled to just San Miguel Academy. Fortunately, St. Benedict's Prep, with a long and mighty tradition of helping kids like Denzel, accepted him into their program. In fact, St. Benedict's became not only Denzel's new school in eighth grade, but his family as well. People like Fr. Edwin Leahy, John Rowe, and Craig White, dedicated administrators at St. Benedict's, stepped up to manage the affairs of the young man in their care.

All the while, San Miguel Academy's graduate support staff kept in touch with both Denzel,

and St. Benedict's, to assure that all of Denzel's needs were being met.

Not only did Denzel finish with a 2.95 G.P.A., he also discovered his God-given talent for shotput and discuss. At the New Balance Nationals this past June, Denzel finished within the top 30 high school throwers in the country!

For all of his hard work and dedication Denzel will be joining the Moravian College Class of 2019, and the Greyhound Track and Field Team.

I never realized that a single community can make a difference in so many lives and how everyone has a meaning to their lives. When I was just an infant my mother was taken from me due to a heart attack. Once my mother passed away, my father abandoned my brothers and me. This depressed me because I felt as if no one really loved me. With nowhere else to go we moved in with our grandparents; they were the only ones at the moment that could care for us.

Situations only got worse when I was two years old, I had an incident that scarred me for life.

One day my two older brothers were arguing while playing football in the backyard, and my middle brother locked my older brother out of the house. My older brother became so furious that he punched the back door window just as I was walking to the dinner table. The glass from the door ricocheted directly into my right eye. The pain was unbearable. I began to faint and slowly I drifted into darkness. I awakened in the hospital bed and was only able to see out of one eye. The complete darkness in my right eye indicated that I would have to live with this for the rest of my life.

As I was growing up in middle school many kids questioned me about my eye while others ridiculed me. One day as I was leaving from Boy Scouts I got a flyer with the name of San Miguel Academy of Newburgh. This flyer was the start of something great, something that would change my life forever. On this same night I handed my flyer to my grandparents they scanned it over, and made the decision that I would attend this school. The decision was made easier for them when they realized that it was a tuition free school since they were financially unstable. On the first day I could feel the brotherhood in this school and I had no idea that at this moment my life would change drastically for both good and bad.

As I approached my early teen years I lost both of my grandparents which left me hopeless. I felt as if everything I had accomplished at San Miguel Academy such as improving grades and receiving awards had gone to waste. The death of my grandparents left me lost for a while until I finally understood what my purpose in life was.

I had the need to succeed, to be better than what was on the streets of Newburgh. My drive for success all began in San Miguel Academy and later grew as they enrolled me in St.

Benedict's Prep where I learned to persevere regardless of how difficult life could be. I looked to sports to relieve the physical and mental stress I was experiencing. When I arrived at St. Benedict's I had never played a real sport in my life. In school everyone's required to do a sport, so I began my sporting career as a thrower. I realized during freshman year that it was my calling. Once I began this sport my coach instantly knew that I would become a champion. He told me all I needed was dedication and I definitely had that. St. Benedict's Prep has really improved my life because it has made me more sociable, reliable, and has turned me into what they call a "Benedict's man".

Despite my difficulties in the past, I was able to overcome all obstacles. San Miguel Academy and St. Benedict's Prep together have influenced my life because they taught me that regardless how hard life may become there are always people who are willing to help. All the feelings I had as a boy have given way to confidence and determination. My goal now it to graduate (Moravian) College with a major in sports science and to one day become a coach so that I can influence young people the way my schools changed my life.

Brandon Miller





Seven Years of Service



In 2008, when the Class of 2010 was about to enter seventh grade, it was clear that in order to break the cycle we needed to create high school options for our graduates.

Stepping up for the task were Cathy Wooters and Lauren Steers. They immediately began forging relationships with private day schools and boarding schools in our region. In addition, applications needed to be completed, student essays had to be written, and parents had to be instructed on the dreaded process of filling out financial aid forms.

Adept at organization, Cathy and Lauren created a template for our emerging Graduate Support Program. Over time, that program has placed 92% of our graduates in private high schools, parochial high schools, and boarding schools.

In 2011, Cathy transitioned to become director of our development office. With that, Lauren took over to coordinate our High School Placement and Graduate Support offices. Our student outcomes speak for themselves, and they will be the lasting legacy of Lauren as she steps down from the job.

Ninety six percent of our guys have graduated high school in four years, and a striking 96% are enrolled in vocational programs, community colleges, and four year colleges and universities.

Lauren's efficiency, persuasion, and thoroughness has created partnerships with multiple high schools now attended by our boys. Because of Lauren our GSP program has garnered the respect of admissions people in our partner schools.

The full impact of Lauren's work will not be fully known immediately. One thing for certain is that our guys have been given some of the best opportunities one can imagine. Every indication we have so far is that the young men of San Miguel Academy are excelling beyond expectation and that they desire to become productive men of integrity.
