

Web-based Platforms



iPads have become an indispensable part of our pedagogy at SMAN. Through the generosity of our benefactors we now own enough iPads for each boy.

San Miguel Academy of Newburgh enjoys the fruits of multiple partnerships that add quality to the education of the boys entrusted to us. Many of these partnerships are longstanding, and some are still emerging. Anyone familiar with the phenomenon of low opportunity environments realizes that urban schools around our nation struggle for grade level performance by pupils who live in challenging places. Here at SMAN we consistently graduate boys in 8th grade, all of whom are reading on, or exceeding, grade level. The same holds true for mathematics.

One of the reasons for this success, besides the outstanding and committed faculty serving our children, is the supplemental web platforms that we provide to our boys. Four years ago we contracted with LightSail, a motivational online reading app, for the school. Since the inception of the reading app we have seen a marked increase in reading scores. Even the folks at LightSail tell us the rise in the boys' scores is unprecedented in urban America. We have done the same supplemental work with our mathematics classes. The online aid for math is

known as ALEKS. ALEKS is a web-based, artificially intelligent assessment and learning system. ALEKS quickly and accurately determines exactly what a student knows in the math sequence. ALEKS then instructs the student on the topics he is most ready to learn. A student who shows a high level of mastery of an ALEKS course will be successful in the actual course he is taking with a teacher, while also allowing him to advance at a pace with which he is comfortable. An added benefit is that these platforms allow us to give our receiving high schools data on student competencies that is current and accurate.

Together, these two web-based learning platforms, ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCES if you will, are a revolutionizing trend in education to individualize educators' efforts in the classroom. We find it to be working, and so these supplemental practices are part of our daily routine at SMAN. Fortunately we now have a 1:1 ratio for iPad and student! When visiting SMAN, ask the boys their Lexile or ALEKS ranking and they will tell you. Another sign the program is working.

Mohonk Preserve




High upon "the ridge" our boys do some of their best learning!

One of our most enduring and productive educational partnerships is with Mohonk Preserve located on the ridge of the Shawangunk Mountains near New Paltz, New York. For almost 8 years SMAN and the preserve have partnered for the benefit of our students. Minority males are the most unrepresented demographic in ecological studies and in the

conservation movement. With that in mind, Mohonk Preserve and SMAN have utilized an intensive curriculum that adds quality to our STEAM program while also opening up new career possibilities for the boys. With 25 visits during the regular academic year, it is often the case that grades 6, 7 and 8 are "on the road" on Wednesdays at the preserve.

Storm King Arts Center



A favorite destination for the academy is nearby Storm King Arts Center. In recent months our partnership has expanded as our educators collaborate to blend art and STEM, better known as STEAM.

Recently the boys dissected owl excrement to see what kind of diet the birds were enjoying in their habitat in Dutchess County. The boys also tend to the working farm by doing chores immediately upon arrival. We are grateful to Stacey Lynch Adnams, Program Director of the farm, for her support in this partnership.

Constitution Marsh

Constitution Marsh Audubon Center and Sanctuary is a unique and beautiful tidal marsh located in Putnam County, New York, and serves as a vital natural habitat in the Hudson River Estuary. It is located in Cold Spring, on the east shore of the Hudson River. For many years The Marsh and SMAN have partnered. The Marsh education director, Rebecca Schultz, has fashioned a curriculum that makes our guys aware of

the importance of the Hudson River in our lives. Birds, fish, and even millions of people rely on the mighty Hudson River in our region. Studying the river helps our boys to envision new possibilities for a healthy planet while also making them aware of the array of career possibilities available to them in the 21st century.

Sprout Creek Farm

One of our longest and most efficacious partnerships has been with Sprout Creek Farm in Poughkeepsie. This working farm, recently acquired by Marist College, gives our boys an insight into sustainable agriculture and organic farming. In addition, Sprout Creek Farm produces some of the best quality cheese in our region. Chef Mark, now executive director of the farm, teaches our boys

cooking techniques for healthy living. Sister Margo Morris, RSCJ, founder of the farm, has been a fantastic advocate for our boys. The late Sister Georgie Blaeser, RSCJ, made sure that all of our programming was funded and sustainable. With Marist College at the helm, we are hoping that our partnership will continue to flourish in the years ahead.

Touro College of Medicine

Touro College of Medicine has become a new partner of SMAN through the efforts of benefactor, Anne Turnbull. With a full day tour of the college in Middletown, New York, the 8th grade boys learned about all of the facets of the medical profession. We expect to return to TCM as an ongoing adjunct to our STEAM programming.

The International Boys' Schools Coalition

Founded in 1995, the International Boys' Schools Coalition is a not-for-profit organization of schools dedicated to the education and development of boys worldwide, the professional growth of those who work with them, and the advocacy and advancement of institutions - primarily schools for boys - that serve them. SMAN has been a member school for more than 5 years. You may remember that an international cohort of researchers worked with Mr. Frank Snyder to analyze our STEM programming in 2014. The benefit of ongoing research helps us to critically analyze all that we do at our school, both curricular and co-curricular, so that we can create the best outcomes for the boys.

Presently, nearly 50 IBSC member schools,

including San Miguel Academy of Newburgh, have joined a two-year project which is being led by CIRCLE — the Centre for Innovation, Research, Creativity, and Leadership in Education, based in Sydney, Australia.

The project uses a well-researched framework for schools to evaluate current practices, processes, and programs in character education; sharpen strategy and planning for character education. We are proud to have been chosen for this particular research project as character formation is our central emphasis.
